Dr Mythri Shankar talks to **Saaniya Zaveri** about her dream home—a unique themed villa located on the outskirts of Bangalore

Shankar's villa. It's a two-storey house with four bedrooms and three baths, in the Eagleton Golf Village, that has rightly been given the name 'Solitude'. It has a beautiful garden with a Buddha statue and a pebbled pathway.

Each room in the house has its very own theme. The Space Room as it's called has a unique wallpaper from the Smithsonian. "It depicts the evolution of the Earth starting with the Big Bang theory in cosmos. An entire wall which lights up when the room is darkened depicts the solar system with the stars
